A Lifeline in the Storm

When Hurricane Milton tore through Florida in the fall of 2024, Therese T. returned to devastation. Her home had sustained nearly \$50,000 in damages. With her husband gone, the challenges of rebuilding seemed insurmountable.

“Coming home to a damaged home and seeing all the destruction surrounding me was devastating and overwhelming,” she said. “Thanks to MOAA’s Crisis Relief Program, I was able to begin the rebuilding process immediately. Your help brought light to a very dark situation.”

Therese’s story reflects the experiences of hundreds of military families who turned to The MOAA Foundation’s Crisis

Relief Program. In 2024 alone, the program processed more than 350 applications for assistance in the wake of hurricanes Helene and Milton. More than 75% of all approved requests that year were directly tied to those storms.

The Crisis Relief Program exists for moments like these. In 2024 and the first quarter of 2025, the program distributed more than \$539,000 in direct aid. Grants ranged from a few hundred dollars to \$5,000, depending on need, with the average approved applicant reporting a household income of \$55,998. Importantly, more than 80% of approved households had at least one dependent, and over half had already sought help

from other organizations before turning to MOAA.

Recognizing that the original \$500 cap on assistance was not enough to truly meet the needs of families facing catastrophic events, The MOAA Foundation raised the maximum grant amount to \$1,000 in the summer of 2024. This decision allowed aid to have a stronger, more lasting impact, especially for families struggling with repairs, displacement, and medical bills.

The need extended across every branch of service, from enlisted families facing sudden loss of income to retired officers managing unplanned expenses. In fact, in 2024, 385 enlisted families and 75 officer families

received direct support through the program.

There’s gratitude, shared by many others, reminds us that behind every chart and every statistic is a family rebuilding their life. “I still have a long way to go with repairs,” she said, “but I was thankful for the immediate support that helped me take the first steps forward.”

Because of donor generosity, MOAA Charities was able to provide not just financial relief but also compassion, dignity, and hope at a time when families needed it most. Each gift extended through the Crisis Relief Program demonstrates the enduring bond of the military community, no matter the storm. IIII



guidance on finance, benefits, and career strategy.

- 7,251 registered participants turned to these free learning opportunities, including 572 military spouses (8% of attendees), highlighting how MOAA supports entire families.
- 3,830 individuals joined additional transition-focused lectures and events, 465 of whom (12%) came from the enlisted ranks, reflecting MOAA's commitment to inclusivity and broad reach.

This array of programming — from résumé building and LinkedIn clinics to federal employment strategies and networking opportunities — equips participants with the tools and confidence to successfully navigate the civilian job market.

United In Service: Building Strong Communities and Bright Futures

Across the country, MOAA is dedicated to fostering a lifeline for the entire uniformed services community — service-members, veterans, military spouses, as well as retirees, their survivors, and families. Through two vital programs — community outreach and career transition — your support delivers both immediate help when it's needed most and pathways to opportunities for tomorrow.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH: EMPOWERING LOCAL IMPACT

In 2025, the Community Outreach Grant Program delivered 55 grants totaling over \$129,000 to 42 MOAA councils and chapters — a record-setting expansion of impact and outreach. Grants were directed toward services such as food assistance,

housing support, veterans treatment courts, military transition seminars, and camps for children of fallen servicemembers.

Since the program's start in 2017, it has awarded over 300 grants totaling more than \$780,000 to support local military and veteran families across 10 critical areas of need: housing, food assistance, employment, health (including behavioral health), family support, community reintegration, financial assistance, legal help, transportation, and emergency relief.

CAREER TRANSITION: LAUNCHING NEW CHAPTERS

In 2025, the Career Transition Program reached thousands of individuals across the uniformed services community:

- 37 expert-led webinars offered



Outreach Grants at Work

Catalina Mountains (Ariz.) Chapter

Grant amount: \$1,600

The chapter worked with the leadership of Esperanza En Escalante — an organization that provides housing, social services, programs, and transportation to assist veterans' transitions into everyday life — to identify four veterans who would soon be transitioning back into the community and who did not have their own computer. The chapter used grant funds to purchase four new Dell laptops for these veterans. One recipient was trying to complete online courses on his phone to obtain a commercial driver's license, and the new laptop made it considerably easier to complete his classes online.

Cape Fear (N.C.) Chapter

Grant amount: \$3,000

The chapter worked with Fayetteville Area Habitat for Humanity's Veteran Repair Program, which provides critical

home repair services for qualifying veterans. The grant allowed the chapter's team of 13 volunteers, along with Habitat for Humanity, to help a veteran repair his home that had significant needs. Addressing housing impediments alleviated a significant life need that will enable this veteran to engage more fully in normal life processes and activities that lead to improved personal well-being.

Treasure Coast (Fla.) Chapter

Grant: \$1,050

About 20% of the 29,000 veterans and families living along the Treasure Coast of Florida are dealing with food insecurity and hunger. The chapter allocated the grant funds to Sarah's Kitchen and Mustard Seed Ministries based on the needs of veterans at each location. Members from the chapter also assisted the mobile feeding pantry every Thursday and at five churches in St. Lucie County.

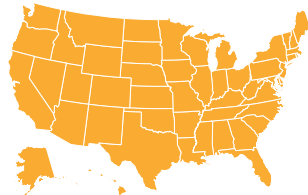
